Brothers and sisters in Jesus,

There is a movie that is coming out called "War Room". It is about a couple who is struggling with life and marriage, An older woman comes into the life of the wife and shows her her war room-a room dedicated to prayer. The movie is about how prayer changes life. "Prayer is a powerful weapon," states the movie. I tell you that so I can tell you this...

Sometimes we will feel Him so close to us and sometimes not. Do not give up but keep praying.

One of our new projects is a Prayer Chain. A Prayer Chain is a group of people praying for people and the church. The person in charge of the prayer chain calls the first person with the concerns or people to prayer for. The first person calls the second person and so on down the line. This is all done confidentially because some concerns people do not want as public knowledge.

So what do we need? First, I need a person to co-ordinate the prayer chain. The would receive requests, make sure the chain is not broken. Second, I need some prayer warriors who will take time daily to pray for those people or requests and call the next person in line. In addition, fresh produce and flowers from your garden may be brought to the church on Saturday, September 26 from 11:00-12:00.


Due to state law, no home-canned foods may be donated.



The Feast of St. Francis of Assisi

Many churches in the United States celebrate the Feast of St Francis of Assisi on October 4 each year. The feast commemorates the life of St Francis, who was born in the 12th century and is the Catholic Church's patron saint of animals and the environment. It is a popular day for pets to be "blessed". This year it just happens that October 4th falls on a Sunday.

All Creatures of Our God and King (#835 ELW, 527LBW LASST UNS ERFREUEN) Text: St. Francis of Assisi (1182-1226) Music: Ralph Vaughan-Williams (1872-1958) An expression of praise found in nearly every hymnal, this hymn was originally written by one of the most interesting figures in all of church history, Giovanni Bernardone, aka: Saint Francis of Assisi! A medieval monk, he spent his lifetime as an itinerant evangelist, preaching and helping the poor of Italy. After an early indulgent life as a soldier, he reformed dramatically at the age of twenty-five, and determined to serve God by imitating the selfless life of Christ. Although his parents were people of considerable means, Francis scorned the possession of material goods, denounced his inherited wealth, denied himself all but the most meager necessities, and devoted himself completely to moving about his area as Christ's representative. At twenty-eight Francis founded the influential Franciscan Order of Friars, which developed into a large movement of young men and some women who adopted his religious beliefs and ascetic style of life. Saint Francis was known as a great lover of nature, seeing in creation the very hand of God. One of the well-known master paintings from this period by the famous Italian artist, Giotto, shows Saint Francis feeding the birds in a garden area. A familiar verse that has become especially popular in recent years is the thoughtful prayer written by this medieval monk during the early years of his life. It begins, "Lord, make me an instrument of Thy peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love ..." There are some interesting and strange incidents and legends associated with the life of Saint Francis which are difficult to explain. Historical accounts relate various visitations that Saint Francis is supposed to have had with the Lord. One of those occasions was while Francis was fasting for forty days in the lofty mountain of La Verne. This encounter left him, for the remainder of his life, bearing on his hands, feet and body the stigmata (or painful wounds) of the crucified Lord. Another account, whether fact or fiction, states that as his soul was being committed to the creator, a flock of larks gathered unmistakably about his little hut and rose, singing a beautiful song in the still evening air. "All Creatures of Our God and King" is from a larger collection of his writings entitled, *Cantico di Fratre Sole* or *Canticles of Brother Sun* and is said to have been written one hot summer day in 1225 while Francis was very ill and suffering from the recent loss of his eyesight. Throughout his life, Saint Francis made use of singing and believed strongly in the importance of church music. In all, Saint Francis wrote more than sixty hymns for use in the monastery. LASST UNS ERFREUEN is the one and only of his works that appears in most hymnals and has survived the passing of these many centuries as a beautiful expression of praise to our Creator. The Roman Catholic hymnal of Cologne, Germany included this hymn in 1623 but the English version did not appear until 1919 in The English Hymnal as a children's hymn. Hopefully you will remember this study in hymnody as you sing "All Creatures of Our God and King" on Sunday October 4th. See you in worship!

- -- box of 16 or 24 crayons
- -- eraser, approx. 2 1/2 inches long

Prayer Shawl Ministry

Our Social Ministry Committee would like to start our prayer shawl ministry again. So you might wonder what a prayer shawl is?

The prayer shawl ministry gives knitter and crocheters a tangible way to care for others. Our age is one of loneliness, and many crave connection and true community. Until we find connection, we are alone. Except that God's hungering spirit within us seeks connection with God's life-giving Spirit beyond us. It draws from our terrible loneliness, to holy communion with the same Spirit living in another human soul, in the ministry of congregation, in loving service, or even in our work.

The driving force of the ministry remains an outreach. We reach out to the needs of those whom God brings to us. Shawls, made for centuries, are universal and embracing. They enfold, cover, wrap, give solace and warmth. They are a symbol of inclusive and unconditional loving.

Besides the obvious reasons of comfort during illness or grief, the shawls can be given for times of joy and celebration, such as: nursing shawls for new mothers, baptisms, birthdays, bridal gifts, ordinations, etc. Those who have received these shawls have been uplifted and affirmed, as if given wings to fly above their troubles.

You give a shawl and let the Holy Spirit do the work. The shawl says I love you, I'm here for you, and I'm praying for you. Knitters pray for the recipient as they knit. Written prayers for health and wellbeing can be attached when presented.

It comes with no expectations, and is only a gift of love.

"You have been prayed for, and this is a token of our love."

Prayer shawls should be 30" wide and 72" long. They may be knitted or crocheted. You may use any stitch pattern, but it is suggested to use multiples of 3, to signify the Holy Trinity. Any yarn is acceptable, but it is best if it is washable. You can knit and pray for a particular person or just pray for someone in need.

Food Bank Sunday is the second Sunday of each month.

Please bring your food items on that day and place them in the bins in the narthex. Good Shepherd is especially responsible for canned fruit, jelly, and applesauce. Of course, any food staples will be accepted on any Sunday.

On the Second Sunday of the month **(September 13)** our prayers will include the food gifts, the recipients, and the donors.

Items especially needed at this time are: Pancake Mix, Pancake Syrup and Jelly (small size).



Andrew Berdahl Student Government Leader at Muhlenberg College



Andrew Berdahl, a member of Jordan Lutheran Church, Orefield was elected

president of the Student Government Association at Muhlenberg College for the 2015-16 academic year.

At Jordan, Andrew has been an active member "since First Grade," as an acolyte, a reader during worship, an usher, and member of the most recent call committee. Andrew especially remembers the occasion when he preached a "faith alone sermon."

Having attended the 2013 Youth Gathering in New Orleans, he looked forward to the gathering in Detroit this summer.

Academics at Muhlenberg are "huge" for Andrew. While It would be easy to put religion on the back burner during college years, Andrew regularly attends Chapel worship on Sundays and participates in the Interfaith Council.

He has a deep appreciation for the ministry of Chaplain Callista Isabelle, especially for the way she makes the Chapel a meaningful place for thought and prayer.



A MINISTRY OF GRACE

Every Pastor and congregational member has the desire to discover a way to make the sacrament of baptism more meaningful to the family of the child brought to God's font for baptism. In 2008 the Director of Christian Education at St. John, Hamburg attended an event and learned about a tradition called the Baptismal Chest.

The Baptismal Chest is a wooden chest measuring 18X9x10 presented to all children on the day of their baptism. It is a symbol of the presence of God in the church and in the family home, much like the Ark of the Covenant was to the children of Israel. The baptismal chest travels through life with the child as he/she grows into faith.

The chest contains important faith formation articles from the sacrament of baptism such as the baptismal candle, Chrisom, a certificate, pictures, and the baptismal napkin. As the faith journey continues, other items may be saved as well: study Bibles, devotionals, journals, confirmation information, church camp memorabilia, youth gathering tee shirts, a cross, and marriage remembrances.

St. John's is fortunate to have Harold Miller, affectionately called Freck, a master craftsman who formerly worked as a pattern maker for Emhardt Foundry in Hamburg and Behler Patterns, Inc. in Deer Lake. Since his retirement Freck works in his wood shop located in the basement of his home making dollhouses, center pieces for congregational dinners, and bean bag games for the church picnic.

Freck is currently assisted by Ken and Elaine Arndt, also members of St. John's, who work with him to create the baptismal chests. It takes about a week to complete one chest. Together this team presents the newly baptized child of God with a gift that reminds them of God's grace and the faith community that surrounds them for the rest of their lives.

How Do We Keep Youth After Confirmation?

Getting youth involved in the church begins at Baptism, so why wait until confirmation age to invite them to participate in worship leadership (reading lessons, serving as greeters, or serving as an usher for example)?

Why wait until confirmation to involve them in any of the ministries of your congregation? If you are waiting until confirmation to involve them, you are too late.

What about involving youth in ministries beyond your congregation's walls and working side by side with them as you visit shut-ins (more than just singing Christmas carols) or help clean up a neighborhood or participate in Bike for World Hunger or some other



ministry?

adult in her congregation, this synod, and the ELCA.

As you will hear, her faith journey and involvement in the church began in her home congregation, but eventually extended outward into other ministries of the church.

Community Vegetable Garden

The community vegetable garden at Christ, Hellertown, now in its third growing season, started in spring 2013 with four ten foot long raised beds. The garden increased in size last year to seven beds, and two and a half of those beds were dedicated to grow food just for the local food bank. Six gardeners have bed space. No chemicals are allowed, and they try to use organic fertilizer only. All the gardeners have been asked to give a percentage of their crops to the food bank.

Garden produce is collected both from the church garden and from home gardens, and purchased produce is also received. The giving season runs from May to October. The local food bank is open the third and fourth Saturdays each month, and various people take the produce over on Saturday mornings. This spring they started tracking the giving on a simple tally sheet.

The goal is to share some of the Lord's bounty. Bags of carrots, potatoes, and other veggies as well as fruit are collected so that those less fortunate can have more fresh produce.
