Social Ministry is comprised of the following members: Co-Chairs Judy Fehr and JoLynn Claroni, Dot Clauser and Renae Yelles. Together this committee along with great help from the congregation, carries out a tremendous part of God's work.

The committee is a liaison to the following programs:

- Northampton Area Food Bank, receives monthly food item donations. The committee coordinates and delivers on a monthly basis donations of food items by our congregational members.
- The Produce Sharing Table, is going on now. Bring in your extra veggies, fruit, and flowers to share on this table. Congregational members patronize the sharing table by making a free will offering. Each year the money is then donated to a worthy cause.
- There is a Gracedale County Nursing Home Visitation Program. This is a great way to let Gracedale residents know they are not forgotten. Please think about joining us in a visit. It will not only make their day but it will make you feel that you made a difference in their lives for that day.
- **The In-Touch Program** is for our homebound members. We let them know they are remembered each month through cards, gifts and messages sent by fellow congregational members.
- There is a Prayer Shawl Ministry coordinated by Pastor Gary. He distributes the shawls throughout the year. We are always looking for people to donate prayer shawls. Directions for the shawls are on the bulletin board in the Narthex along with yarn for congregational members who are willing to make a shawl to donate for this ministry.
- **Northern LV Mission District Ingathering** is also a responsibility of this committee. Miscellaneous items, along with winter apparel are collected and then given to various facilities/shelters during the holiday season.
- **Bingo**, last year I was lucky enough to accompany this committee for The Social Ministry Bingo Party that was held at Fellowship Community in Whitehall on a personal care unit. We all had a great time and it was so nice to talk to the residents. Fellowship residents left with smiles and small prizes and the committee left with a warm heart.
- Eucharistic Ministry is a program where parishioners are trained as Eucharistic Ministers to serve communion to the homebound. Currently the committee has three Eucharistic Ministers who serve communion to the homebound and are always eager to welcome new Eucharist Ministers into this committee mission. Our Eucharistic Ministers are: Dorothy Clauser, Brenda Druckermiller and Renae Yelles.
- **Harvest Home** Ministry collects food and money to go to a very good cause. Last year they donated to the Northampton Area Food Bank and also The Victory House.

2019 Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod Assembly

I had the privilege of representing Good Shepherd at the 2019 Synod Assembly on June 1 in Hazelton. This was my first time attending an Assembly and it was interesting and informative.

My day began with an orientation session for first time delegates. The presenter remarked that since our synod is the largest in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the 60 plus "newbies" in the room would outnumber the total attendance at some small synods.

The opening Festival Worship was led by Bishop Samuel Zeiser and Vice-President Kristen Edelman-Weiner, the clerical and lay leaders of the Synod. Communion distribution to 500 worshipers requires multiple communion stations and careful organization. The offering (\$3600) was designated for ELCA World Hunger.

The business of the Synod was conducted at two Plenary Sessions. The morning session included an address by the representative from the ELCA national office (an offering of \$3300 was collected for The Campaign for the ELCA), and reports by the Synod Bishop and Vice President. In his report, Bishop Zeiser, who will be retiring next year after 12 years as Bishop, frankly discussed Synod challenges: many congregations are struggling and congregations are closing, pastors are in short supply, and everyone will need to join together to support the new bishop for the church to survive and thrive.

After an outdoor luncheon to celebrate the 50th anniversary of our Synod, we assembled for the second Plenary Session. Elections for synod offices were held (Kristen Edelman-Weiner was elected to a four year term as Vice-President), the Synod budget was approved, and compensation guidelines for pastors and deacons were adopted. The longest and most involved discussion (with substitute resolutions and amendments) revolved around a resolution related to synod youth, young adult and family ministry leadership; a ministry team will prepare a report for the new bishop next year.

Next year's Synod Assembly (June 4-6 at Kalahari Resort in Pocono Manor) will be a three day event since a new bishop will be elected.

Stewardship of our civic freedoms

As Americans celebrate the birthday of our nation, we give thanks for our civic freedoms of speech, religion, assembly, due process, a speedy trial, voting and many more. Our freedom has made us the envy of much of the world.

But as with any valuable gift, our civic freedoms can be abused, neglected or underappreciated to the point where, if we aren't careful, they hardly matter anymore.

Lutherans are guided by Martin Luther's insight that we are simultaneously called to be responsible citizens of "two kingdoms" – first, of God's spiritual realm, and second, of earthly governments of people and laws. The synergy of our "dual citizenship" directs us to be good stewards of our civic freedoms.

Freedom of speech: Yes, even hateful speech and lies are protected under our Constitution, but Christians avoid them in obedience to Jesus' command to love our neighbor as ourselves and by the Eighth Commandment, which Luther explains in *The Small Catechism:* "We should fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations." We steward this freedom by speaking honestly and insisting others do, too.

Freedom of religion: Millions of people across the globe, including Christians, face persecution and discrimination because of their faith. We dare not take our freedom for granted, but exercise it with joy and defend the rights of others to follow their own consciences.

Freedom from illegal prosecution: Our guarantees of due process in legal, criminal and civil proceedings uphold justice and guard against government misconduct. It works imperfectly, as do all human systems, but as good stewards we fight for justice and the rights for all.

Freedom of self-governance: With its interconnected checks and balances, our three-branch system of government provides stability, accountability and flexibility for change. It's a great system, but it requires us to be informed and involved. We steward this freedom by participating in political processes, voting and insisting on honest government that works for our interests.

This month, as citizens of both God's spiritual realm and the United States of America, we renew our commitment to be good stewards of the freedoms we are privileged to have.

Highlights from Assembly 2019

Festival Worship

On Saturday, June 1, approximately 500 delegates and visitors gathered at Genetti Ballrooms Inn & Suites in Hazleton for Assembly 2019. The day began with a Festival Worship Service led by Bishop Zeiser and synod Vice-President Kristen Edelman-Weiner. Service music was provided by Deacon Michael Krentz and a volunteer choir. An offering of \$3,600 was collected for World Hunger.



In his sermon, **Bishop Zeiser** spoke of a "stirring" within us when we recognize the active presence of God in our life. Driven by faith, we become convinced that we "are onto something"; and we then are



compelled to see it through. The result is ministry, ministry built on the generations of Christians who likewise were convinced that they were onto something. However, the past, no matter how great, is sometimes unhelpful for this time. Our theme "Freed in Christ for a New Day" reminds us that it is indeed a new time; and it further reminds us of who it is that got us here, and who will come again.

ELCA Churchwide Representative



The **Rev. Ronald T. Glusenkamp**, Director for "Always Being made new: The Campaign for the ELCA," was this year's ELCA Churchwide representative. Pastor Glusenkamp described the ELCA Churchwide ministry and mission in 2018. This included major efforts in advocacy, candidacy, congregational vitality, Fund for Leaders, World Hunger, global mission, and the Youth Gathering. Following Pastor

Glusenkamp's presentation, an offering of over \$3,300 was collected for The Campaign for the ELCA.

Bishop Zeiser's Report to the Synod

Bishop Zeiser reviewed some of the mission and ministry of our Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod during the past year. He then talked about challenges that the next bishop (to be elected at Assembly 2020) will face. He emphasized that many congregations will be facing challenging situations; and that it is critically important for both congregations and rostered ministers to commit to building a collegial relationship with the new bishop and his or her staff as together they face the immense challenges to come.



More Highlights from Assembly 2019

Luncheon

After the morning session, the delegates and visitors adjourned for a luncheon in recognition of the 50th anniversary of the Synod receiving its charter. They enjoyed their meal under a large tent on a beautiful spring afternoon.

Reports from Synod Officers

The Assembly heard reports from the synod officers: Vice President Kristen Edelman-Weiner; Secretary The Rev. Carl Shankweiler; and Treasurer Donald Dillman. The 2020 Spending Plan was adopted with a total budget for next year of \$1,984,400, of which \$869,500 is sent to the ELCA for Mission Support; and \$148,000 is given to various church related institutions such as Bear Creek Camp, United Lutheran Seminary, Muhlenberg College, PA Conference of Churches, and LAMPa.

Resolutions

The Assembly adopted two resolutions. The first was a major revision of "Continuing Resolutions" offered by Synod Council to bring them up to date with current practice. The second was a resolution that the Youth, Young Adult, and Family Ministry Team address the need for synodical youth leadership; and that this Team work with the Transition Team that will report to the new bishop in 2020.

The 2020 compensation guidelines for pastors and deacons were also adopted.
